# <u>Committee Spotlight – Nurture & Care</u>

Some of you may not be aware of a group of volunteers in our congregation who work tirelessly to minister to our elderly and disabled. Working in teams, these individuals send cards, make calls, and visit those who are unable to worship consistently with us in person. Our volunteers are sometimes accompanied by Pastor Jim. As a part of our Missions Committee, Mary Long chairs this sub-committee and keeps it organized. The committee consists of Mary Long, Joyce Martinez, Nancy Sherrod, Alice Carter, Nancy Simpson, Bonnie Mazzoni, Rosalie Robinson, Diane Maxfield, and Erica Gonzalez.

Originally funded by a grant (Beulah grant) through United Methodist Women of the Cal-Nevada Conference, this committee has been operating at Madera UMC since 2021. The committee currently services 29 households. In addition to cards, calls and visits, each household receives a monthly mailing entitled <a href="Home Touch">Home Touch</a>, which includes one double-sided page of puzzles, articles, and brain stimulators for each week of the month.

If you know of someone in need of this type of attention, please notify Mary or Pastor Jim so that we may add them to our list. Of course, all of the individuals for care are kept confidential. If you are interested in offering nurture and care to others, please feel free to contact Mary, or just attend the next meeting.

The committee meets the second Wednesday of each month in the Conference Room at 5:30 p.m., so the next meeting will be on June 11, 2025. If this sounds like something you would be interested in, please join us – the rewards are tremendous!

## **Know Your Church Family**



David and Geri Brown have both lived in Madera their entire lives. In August, they will celebrate their anniversary of 52 years.

Dave attended George Washington Elementary School, and Geri (McCarty) went to James Monroe Elementary School. "He lived on this side of Cleveland," Geri said. "And I was on the other side of Cleveland. We lived over by our church." She was referring to Trinity Lutheran Church on Lake Street.

They met in junior high, while attending Thomas Jefferson Middle School, but began dating when they were juniors in high school. "We rode on the same bus. We waited at the same bus stop," Geri said.

They graduated together from Madera High in 1972, and both of them went on to attend Fresno State. After one year of college, they got married. She was 18 and he was 19. "My whole family liked her," Dave said. He admitted he had been a Baptist before he began attending the Lutheran church with Geri. She said, "He told his granddad that we were getting married and I was Lutheran. His granddad said 'Well that's the next best thing to being Baptist."

Dave was interested in the construction business. It just didn't make sense to him to take biology and history in order to be a house builder, so he decided to take a year off from school to see what he wanted to do.

Geri wanted to be a mom, so neither of them went back to Fresno State. "We graduated from the School of Hard Knocks," she said. "We wanted to start a family, and we did."

Dave said, "I started from scratch. I wanted to be an architect, so I started with architectural drafting. Then after a year at Fresno State, I decided I liked the outside. I didn't want to be inside just drawing plans. That's when I decided to try construction."

He got his contractor's license in 1974. Geri said at that time he was the youngest one in California. "He built a house between our senior year and our freshman year of college," she said. "His dad had a property and said, 'Build me a rental." That was Dave's first experience in the building process.

"I was successful in building my construction business. My company was called Madera Custom Builders," he said. He decided he could always go back to school if he wanted or needed to get more education, but he provided well for his family. He built homes throughout Madera County.

Geri said, "And then one day when I had two babies, he came home, and said, 'Let's buy Flowers by Helen.' I looked at him and said, 'Why?' He says, 'It's for sale. Let's buy it.' It became ours." It was right across the street from the post office. At the time, Geri didn't know anything about the flower business, but she learned quickly from the existing employees.

After a couple of years, they bought Madera Flower Shop on the corner of 6<sup>th</sup> and Lake. Shortly afterwards they merged the two businesses into one location, and had that business for about 10 years.

Dave and Geri have two children, Courtney and Matthew, and five grandchildren. All of them live in Madera.

"I put in 25 years at Madera Unified," Geri said. "I volunteered in my kids' classrooms and all my grandkids." She was a teacher's aide at Howard and Lincoln. "I've been on a lot of field trips. We were band parents. Courtney was a flag girl. So, we were band boosters. We had to help with the equipment and stuff at the football games and whatnot."

The family has moved from one house to another many times throughout the Brown's marriage. Dave would build a home for the family, and when someone wanted to buy their house, they would sell and move into another house Dave built.

Dave retired in 2005. They have lived in their current house now for 21 years. "Our next move will be to Jay Chapel," Geri said.

The couple has always worked together, and started several businesses. Dave said, "We've both always been self-employed. Neither of us has ever worked for anybody else."

Geri said, "I've always been working with him. When we sold the flower shop, we started another business called Madera Accounts Receivable. We had gotten a computer to do our billing at the flower shop, and so when we sold, we did the billing and payroll for other businesses."

Now, they have a small pistachio farm of 10 acres located at Avenue 17 off Road 26. It was a piece of property they purchased some time ago. Originally, Dave was going to build a few houses there, but met with some zoning

problems, so they decided not to build.

Then, one day their grandson, Christian, who had graduated from Fresno State, said, "We need to do something with our property. Let's plant trees." So, in 2017, Dave, Geri and their four grandsons planted pistachios. They are now on their third harvest. Christian is their oldest grandson and is now married and living on the property, in a house Dave built for him.

In January 2020, Dave and Geri, along with a group of others from the Lutheran church, came to Madera United Methodist Church. At the end of 2019, Trinity Lutheran Church in Madera closed. The congregation donated the church building to another congregation, now New Life Assembly.

Geri grew up in that Lutheran church. Dave started going there when he began dating Geri. She had been a Sunday School teacher and the financial secretary. Dave had been the council president for the last 15 years. When it was evident the finances would not continue to support the church, the group of Lutherans together decided to close the church and go elsewhere.

"Everybody who was in the church was on the council the last two years," Dave said. "We did it all as a group, and everything we did was unanimous. The switchover from Lutheran to Methodist was easy for us. The differences are so, so slight, you don't even notice."

On Easter Sunday, 2023, the group of former Lutherans joined Madera United Methodist



Church, and the congregation welcomed them with open arms.

Dave and Geri have been retired now for 20 years. Although they stay busy, they have enjoyed their retirement and their close family. They like to travel, and have been on a number of cruises.

"Because we were successful, and we've had each other, we've had a good life," Dave said.


#### **Love INC / MUMC Furniture Ministry**



The local affiliate of Love in the Name of Christ (Love INC) is part of a national organization whose mission is to unite local churches to help those in need. The premise is that the local church is God's answer to community brokenness and a part of his plan of redemption and restoration. Love INC mobilizes local churches to offer a holistic approach to caring for people in all areas of life: spiritual, mental, emotional, and physical.

The Love INC Madera Connection Center takes many requests for help each year. All calls are answered by caring volunteers who listen to understand people's situations and direct them to the most appropriate source of help. This can mean a referral to an area agency or services provided by area churches and volunteers. The following two graphics depict how the Love INC Connection Center works.

The contribution Madera UMC provides to Love INC Madera is a Furniture Ministry. MUMC accepts donated items in good condition which are stored in our shed in the back parking lot. Then when the Connection Center gets a request for a bed or dresser, kitchen table or chairs, they check our inventory in the hope the needed item is on hand and, if so, it is given to the family or individual in need. Anyone with gently used furniture is asked to contact the office to arrange for the donation to be held in our Furniture Ministry inventory.

## **Landscape Plan Update**

We received 27 responses to the Survey Monkey. Thank you to all who took the time to voice their opinion. Following are the

results of the survey:

1. Would you agree that the front of the church would be more appealing if it were landscaped?

2. Knowing that 32% of the cost of the project is already available and that another 9% of the cost has already been pledged, would you be willing to support this project financially?

3. Keeping in mind that the two plans we have presented (and are pictured below) both have low maintenance plants, drought resistant plants, and conserve water by using a drip system, which of the two plans would you prefer to see adopted?

The plan with the trees: 25.9% - 7 The plan with the artificial grass: 55.5% - 15

Neither of the above: 18.5% - 5

The Trustees Committee would like to thank Carol Kennedy and Bert Roper for the many hours they have spent developing these plans over the past five (5) years.

Others who need to be thanked are Fred and Martha Mossman, Crystal, Jonathan and Eric Wiggins, David Simpson, David Eddy, Doug Baron and Pastor Jim Garrison for their many, many hours attempting to repair and service the existing irrigation system. This hydraulic system is over 60 years old and parts are now almost impossible to obtain.

Based on the results of the survey, Trustees determined that there is not enough interest in either plan to move forward at this time. Since there needs to be a solution to the water waste (and the cost involved) the church is experiencing and we still wish to maintain the already existing trees and plants, Trustees will pursue other ideas regarding the front of the church and the surrounding grounds.

#### **New Vision Statement**



The Council of Bishops is announcing the unveiling of a new vision statement for the United Methodist Church which reflects the

Church's deep commitment to embodying God's dream for the world.

The new vision statement is: The United Methodist Church forms disciples of Jesus Christ who, empowered by the Holy Spirit, love boldly, serve joyfully, and lead courageously in local communities and worldwide connections.

The vision statement complements the Church's longstanding mission statement inspired by Matthew 28: 1-20. "This new vision is not simply a statement or a plan, it is a catalyst for transformation," said Bishop Tracey Smith Malong, President of the Council of Bishops. "It is a vision that will help the Church embrace the opportunities before us, to follow where God is leading us, and to more fully engage in our mission of making disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the



world."

Resources will be shared this summer at Annual Conference sessions and with leaders within local churches, with lay member resources anticipated to follow in late 2025 to early 2026.

#### **Blessing Bags**

Getting ready for our summer distribution of Blessing Bags. This will be the third distribution, and the goal is to assemble 150 bags. Bags will include deodorant, tissues, lip balm, sunglasses, sunblock shaving kits, lotions, dog and cat food. The filled drawstring bags are distributed during a regular Saturday meal at the Holy Family Table.

The total cost of the items for the bags is almost \$800 and Missions Committee is asking for special donations to cover the cost of the included items. Beginning in June, envelopes

will be available for contributions and all donations are greatly appreciated. MUMC youth participate in handing out the bags.

#### **Estate Planning**



#### Remembering your church in your estate

We're almost halfway through 2025, and it is a good time to think about estate planning. We all have something to pass on to others when we leave this world, and whether you are a young person or an older adult, you need to think about how you want to distribute what you have so that others can benefit. We don't know when our final moment will come, so it is never too soon to make those plans.

Your church can be a beneficiary of your estate or a life insurance policy. If you have not already done so, consider naming Madera United Methodist Church as a beneficiary. Our building is in constant need of attention. If you are planning to give to the church as a beneficiary, you might consider designating some of your giving to the Building Maintenance Fund.

# Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) and contributions to the church

If you have an individual retirement account (IRA) and you have reached the age for which you are required to distribute annually some of your account (called a Required Minimum Distribution, or RMD), you may give some or

all of this distribution to the church, with greater tax benefit than if you gave to the church from other accounts.

This is called a Qualified Charitable Distribution. A qualified charitable distribution (QCD) is a distribution made directly by the trustee of your individual retirement arrangement (IRA), other than an SEP or SIMPLE IRA, to certain qualified organizations. The total QCDs for the year can't be more than \$100,000.

If all the requirements are met, a QCD may be nontaxable. This means it will not be reported as income, and because it will not be in your income, it cannot be reported as a deduction on your Schedule A. However, this is a greater tax benefit than what a Schedule A deduction will give.

Some people in our church family have already taken advantage of this benefit. If you would like to hear more about it, contact the administrator of your IRA.
